
Comics and 9/11



- Immediate response
- The Amazing Spider-Man #36
 - by J. Michael Straczynski & John Romita, Jr.
 - focus on inability of superheroes to save the day
 - focus on common humanity
 - focus on innocent victims
 - question of who is a hero

- Article by Johnson, "Terrified Protectors"
- argues that comics got 'darker' in the post-2001 world
 - initial response: grief
 - but then -> darker story lines
- reflected massive changes
 - in U.S., new laws that restricted civil liberties ("Patriot Act," etc.)
 - global war on terror:
 - invasions of Afghanistan & Iraq
 - global drone wars
 - use of torture

- Avengers Disassembled (2004)
 - writer: Brian Michael Bendis (1967-)
 - Avengers essentially destroyed / killed
 - Scarlet Witch creates a new warped reality -> random attacks
 - kill and maim
 - no one safe
- House of M (2005)
 - also by Bendis
 - mutants take over in a terrorist plot
- *Civil War* (2007)
 - writer: Mark Millar
 - US government regulates superheroes
 - Superhuman Registration Act
 - asks superheroes to work with U.S. government
 - Iron Man vs. Captain America
 - C.A. capitulates
 - eventually in post-Civil War world, C.A. dies
- Secret Invasion (2008)
 - Who can you trust?
- Basic philosophical issue
 - freedom vs. security
 - fundamental issue in American society in post 9-11 world
